


Holistic Pet Care Exotic Animal Guide – Ferrets



Basic Information



- Average size: 15 inches long
- Lifespan: 5-10 years with proper care
- Average weight: 2 4 ½ lbs
- Sleeps 15-18 hours a day.
- Carnivores



- Large, multi-tier pen/cage with secure door and solid flooring. Ensure habitat is escape proof, as they will try.
 - Enclosure should have plenty of hiding places and bedding material to dig
 - Can be litter trained. Clean daily
 - Proper bedding with crumble paper or soft animal bedding
 - > Deep clean entire habitat once a week
 - Have several toys: bells, ball toys, hammocks, paper bags, cardboard boxes, ball pit, long tubes
 - Clean and filtered water in bowl



Diet/Treats

Proper diet: Daily

- Raw food/eat: chicken, beef, lamb, eggs, birds
- Ensure raw food has flesh/skin, organ meat, muscle meat and edible bones

Treats: Offer once or twice a week

- Anything with high meat/protein content.
- Meaty treat sticks





Health Guide

Positive Health Qualities:

- Playful and active energy
- Assortment of chirping/chattering sounds
- Digging and hiding in "dens"
- Shiny coat and clear eyes
- Eating and drinking regularly
- * Naps regularly

Red Flags of Concern:

> Weight Loss > Eye discharge

> Nasal discharge > Hair Loss > Diarrhea > Skin lesions

> Lethargic > Overgrown nails

> Mouth sensitivity

General Care:

Physical examinations annually Trim nails every 2-3 weeks Bathe with specific Ferret shampoo monthly

Common Health Concerns

Health Concern	Symptoms	Actions to Take
Diarrhea	Loose stool caused by poor diet,	Have fecal tested with ve

Diarrhea	Loose stool caused by poor diet, stress, internal parasites or unclean housing	Have fecal tested with veterinarian to determine cause and treat accordingly
Ear mites	Parasite causing itching and brownish discharge from ears	Physical exam with veterinarian, determine type of mites and treat accordingly
Upper Respiratory Infection	Crusty eyes, nasal discharge and difficulty breathing	Consult veterinarian
Adrenal Gland disorder	Caused by early spay/neutering; loss of hair	Consult veterinarian
